 <b>BIG IDEA</b>	<p>The greatest discovery of your life is just on the other side of the words “Let’s Go!”</p>
 <b>ICE BREAKER</b>	<p>What's the most amazing place or sight you've seen in person? What motivated you to go see it, and how did experiencing it firsthand differ from just hearing about it?</p>
 <b>MAIN POINTS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● The greatest discoveries in life happen when we move beyond curiosity to action</li> <li>● Both the shepherds and wise men acted on what they learned and left their responsibilities to seek Jesus</li> <li>● After finding Jesus, they couldn't help but share what they'd seen</li> <li>● They brought intentional, meaningful gifts</li> </ul>
 <b>DISCUSS</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. What keeps you from taking action when you feel God prompting you to "go" or do something?</li> <li>2. When was the last time you were so excited about encountering God that you couldn't help but tell others?</li> <li>3. The shepherds left their flocks to seek Jesus. What responsibilities or commitments might you need to temporarily set aside to pursue a deeper relationship with God?</li> <li>4. The wise men brought meaningful gifts to Jesus. What gifts (talents, resources, time) could you offer to honor Christ?</li> <li>5. Pastor Cal said, "Anyone who is sincerely looking for Jesus will find him." What practical steps can we take to actively seek Jesus in our daily lives?</li> </ol>
 <b>NEXT STEP</b>	<p>How can we encourage each other to move from curiosity about God to active pursuit of Him?</p> <p>What opportunities do we have this season to invite others to "come and see" Jesus, just as the shepherds shared their experience?</p>

Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord.
